Clay Around





I sell tools, but I still say to anyone starting with polymer clay that all you need is a roller, a blade and a tile to use as a surface! However, you can also collect together bits and pieces from your household - up left are some of the things I have commandeered: in particular that antique spoon has the most beautiful texures embedded into it. And to the right of that is a little steel hedgehog with prickly spines that are great for texturing. Undoubtedly there is no end to the possible uses for disgarded things. The other picture is of the tools that my dentist donated to me (they are invaluable) and top right in the picture is nothing more than a piece of wood with a wet and dry sheet taped to it – making sanding so much easier. In the centre is an ingenious idea that I found on the Net many years ago (and can't find it again so can't attribute it - this is the nearest I have found - - a piece of drain pipe cut into half, and then one half cut into more pieces. The half is secured to a block of wood and the others I have secured to bits of curtain rail. Put your clay in the large half and use the others as different sized form in order to roll perfect beads. And there is more of course. The easiest and most common is to make needle tools. There is a collection on Kater's Achres website and inevitably Ginger has a large selection on her site.

On <u>polymerclayweb</u> you are shown how to make bits and pieces into tools. it wouldn't be hard to create tools <u>like these</u> stainless steel ones on sale from China. There is no end to people's ingenuity for here you are taught how to make an

<u>electric sander and here you are taught to make your own extruder!</u> Sculpey even suggest how you can make an <u>extruder pusher</u>. If you do need extra aids when working with the clay gets difficult another idea would be to create a <u>texturing</u> <u>press.</u> Finally, albeit in French, here is a tutorial showing you how to make <u>your own</u> <u>slicer</u>
